GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS & RULES FOR ENTERING THE FAIR

1. Departments marked 4-H or Youth are for boys and girls 8 through 18 years of age as of January 1, 2026. Anyone 19 years or older is considered an adult.
2. All exhibitors must abide by the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics.
3. Each exhibit must have an entry card made out at the Fairgrounds or obtained in advance at the following locations: Cape Cod Extension Service, Deeds & Probate Building, Barnstable, or at the Fairgrounds Administration Office, Route 151, East Falmouth. ALL entry cards must contain **FULL** names, addresses, city, state, zip of person entering item and **MUST** be legible to read. Personal address labels are acceptable.
4. Exhibitors age 12 and older receive one voucher good for half off a full price gate ticket and exhibitors age 6-11 receive a children's pass good for any time during the fair. Exhibitors receive only one voucher or pass to the Fair.
5. An exhibitor shall make only 1 entry in a given category lot. The Fair has the right to reclassify an exhibit if placed in the wrong class.
6. No exhibits shall be removed before the close of the Fair.
7. All classes are for Amateurs only, except where stated.
 - a. **AMATEUR** - One who receives no compensation in the field they exhibit.
 - b. **PROFESSIONAL** - A person is considered a Professional at the Barnstable County Fair if he or she derives compensation on a regular basis in the field they exhibit.
8. A person shall not offer to exhibit any item not produced and/or prepared by that person in the last 12 months and who is not the owner at the specific time.
9. Soiled fabric pieces will not be accepted.
10. Entries using flowers on the Massachusetts Conservation List will be disqualified.
11. The Committee, Judge or Fair Management reserves the right to reject any or all exhibits they feel are not appropriate.
12. Placing will be awarded on the basis of quality of exhibit and the decision of the judge(s) will be final. Additional judging criteria are noted where appropriate.
13. Exhibitors may not be present during judging.
14. Judges may not be contenders in any amateur class listed in their area of expertise.
15. All reasonable precautions will be taken by the Society for the safe keeping of animals and articles entrusted to its care. However, all exhibits are received upon express condition that the Society shall not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur to animals or articles on exhibit for any reason. Exhibitors, contestants, and/or participants agree to be solely responsible for any loss, injury to, damage done, occasioned by or arising from any exhibit, equipment, animal or person and to defend and indemnify the Society and the management thereof against all claims and liability in regard thereto. In view of this understanding, exhibitors, contestants, and/or participants may deem it advisable to obtain appropriate liability insurance.
16. Any person to whom a premium shall have been awarded or paid in consequence of any deception or misrepresentation used by him/her shall not only forfeit such premiums, but afterwards be prohibited from competing for the Society's premiums.
17. **PREMIUM CHECKS MUST BE CASHED WITHIN 60 DAYS OF RECEIPT - NO EXCEPTIONS.**
18. **AFTER 60 DAYS, PREMIUM CHECKS WILL NOT BE HONORED.** NOTE: Requests for premium pay due will not be accepted after October 15, 2026.
19. Additional rules, premiums and awards are listed in each Department and Class.

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested (by the approved laboratory to which it is sent) is the one taken from the animal in question. Its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

SIGNATURES REQUIRED ON THIS FORM!

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individuals to disciplinary action.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Avian Influenza (HPAI) Notices:

Due to the continuing US outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in domesticated and wild birds and in dairy cattle, Animal Health Officials from all six New England States are united in advising the following for agricultural fairs, competitions, exhibitions, shows, swaps, or other in-person events that encourage the gathering or co-mingling of birds and/or cattle:

Avian species

The New England State Veterinarians strongly discourage the exhibition of domestic and wild waterfowl species and may recommend delaying or canceling domestic fowl or poultry shows. If events are held, best practices for biosecurity should be implemented. Waterfowl exhibitions are currently banned in MA through April 30, 2026, which may be extended.

Bovine species

The New England State Veterinarians strongly discourage the exhibition of any bovines, including both dairy and beef cattle, that have been present in any state at the time that state had a current outbreak of HPAI in cattle. Bovines that have been shipped from currently affected states in 2026 should not be allowed on the premises of New England fairs or shows. Moving to or from an affected state for any reason will void any New England Fair and Show Season Official Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (OCVIs) that have been issued for such cattle for the remainder of the 2026 season.

The USDA APHIS Veterinary Services Federal Order Requiring Testing for and Reporting of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in Livestock issued on April 24, 2024, remains in effect. It can be found on the USDA website: www.aphis.usda.gov/sites/default/files/dairy-federal-order.pdf

General Rules for All Animals:

See M.G.L. c, 128 §2C, 129 §2

Continue to next sections for additional, specific rules for Cattle, Poultry, Goats, Camelids, Swine, Sheep, Equines, Rabbits, and Dogs and Cats.

1. All animals must be:
 - a. In proper physical condition
 - b. Properly identified
 - c. Free of visual evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease at time of arrival
 - a. Animals of any species with open or draining wounds will not be approved for entry.
2. An animal will be rejected from entry if:
 - a. There is evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease or open or draining wounds
 - b. Failure to produce the necessary documents for certification, vaccination, or testing
 - c. **THE INSPECTOR'S DECISION IS FINAL**
3. Any surgical procedure or injection of foreign substance or drug, or the application of any substance which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance is prohibited.
 - a. Irritants, counterirritants, or similar substances that affect the animal's performance, contour, conformation, or appearance is prohibited.
 - b. Exceptions include:
 - a. External applications of substances to the hooves or horns of animals that affect appearance only are permitted.
 - b. Surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the animal are permitted.
4. Official Identification (ID):
 - a. All livestock must have proper official, individual ID as required and approved by the USDA and accepted by the fair or show for the species such as official metal ear tags, tattoos, scrapie tags, or microchips.
 - b. Registration forms must accompany health certificates when used as part of official identification, e.g. with breed registry tattoos or microchips.
5. **Health Certificates: New England Animals Showing in New England States**
 - a. One Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) may be allowed for animals of the same species to be exhibited at fairs or shows in any of the New England States when submitted with an itinerary of the dates and locations of the events at which the listed animals are expected to be shown. Only animals that are healthy at the time of shipment may be moved.

- b. For the 2026 Show and Fair season, OCVIs being used for the full season must meet all the requirements detailed in the 2026 New England Fairs and Shows memo issued jointly by the state veterinarians of CT, ME, MA, NH, RI, and VT (attached at the end of this document). This memo may be updated at any time during the fair season in response to animal health outbreaks.

6. Health Certificates: General Rules for All Animals

- a. Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one health certificate with appropriate individual IDs and descriptions. Animals of different species may not be listed on the same official health certificate.
- b. An itinerary of the names and locations of each New England fair or show at which the owner expects to show the listed animals and the dates when each animal is expected to be on each site must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time of the OCVI is written.
 - a. A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the official health certificate (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show.
 - b. That proposed list should be signed by the veterinarian and the owner/exhibitor and reference the relevant OCVI number(s).
- c. The name and address of the first show or fair where the listed animal will be exhibited is to be used as the “destination” on the OCVI form.
 - a. “See attached list” or similar statement directing Animal Health Official or Fair Inspectors to the attached proposed itinerary must be included.
- d. Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were present on show or fairgrounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check-in.
- e. Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home. If the animal is refused entry to any exhibition during 2026 for health reasons, it must have a new health certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of the next interstate movement.
- f. Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

Cattle Specific Information

See M.G.L c. 129 §§2, 39 and 330 CMR 4.04(2).

Bovine species- Special Notice 2026

The New England State Veterinarians strongly discourage the exhibition of any bovines, including both dairy and beef cattle, that have been present in any state at the time that state

had a current outbreak of HPAI in cattle. Bovines that have been shipped from currently affected states in 2026 should not be allowed on the premises of New England fairs or shows. Moving to or from an affected state for any reason will void any New England Fair and Show Season Official Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (OCVIs) that have been issued for such cattle for the remainder of the 2026 season.

1. Tuberculosis (TB) and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from [TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States](#) (which can be found at <https://www.aphis.usda.gov/livestock-poultry-disease/status-eradication-programs>) and from in-state animals. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795 or 857-348-3922). All animals must be free of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, cowpox, and open or draining wounds.
2. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all cattle be currently vaccinated against rabies.
3. Note: The Big E is requiring RFID official identification tags for all cattle entering The Big E Fairgrounds premises in 2026. Other fairs may add this requirement. Contact the fair office with questions.

Poultry Specific Information

See M. G. L. c. §§2, 129, and 330 CMR 5.02

Important: Waterfowl may not be exhibited, shown, or otherwise gathered or co-mingled at in-person events in Massachusetts until April 30, 2026, unless extended by the Director of Animal Health, per MDAR Order 1-17-AHO-25.

1. No poultry will be admitted to a fairground until it has been individually inspected. 2. All poultry must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: infectious bronchitis, coryza,

pullorum-typhoid, fowl-pox, external parasites, and laryngotracheitis.

3. Each bird must be accompanied by written proof (ID card or test report) that the breeding flock was blood-tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within one year prior to entry date.
4. Birds from quarantined states will not be permitted entry.
5. All birds over 16 weeks of age as of January 1, 2026, shall be individually leg banded with a state leg band. This includes out-of-state exhibitors.
6. No bird vaccinated for laryngotracheitis within thirty (30) days of the fair will be admitted.

Goat Specific Information

See M. G. L. c. 129 §2, 9 CFR 79.6 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

1. Tuberculosis (TB) and brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States (<https://www.aphis.usda.gov/livestock-poultry-disease/status-eradication/programs>) and in-state animals being exhibited in MA.
2. All goats and kids presented, regardless of age, must be individually listed and identified on the health certificate.
3. All goats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: a. Foot rot, mage, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox, and open or draining wounds. b. All goats must also be free of soremouth and scrapie exposure.
4. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to a show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHP 06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363-2290.

Camelid Specific information

See M.G.L. c. 129 §2, M.G.I. c. 131, §23, 321 CMR 9.02.

1. Tuberculosis (TB) and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and from in-state animals. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795 or 857-348-3922).

Swine Specific Information

See M.G.L. c. 129 §14E, 330 CME 11.4(2). 9 CFR 71.19

1. All swine must be identified by an official ear tag or registration.
2. Swine must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, mange, and open or draining wounds.
3. Exhibited swine may not have been fed raw garbage.
4. No person shall import into Massachusetts from outside the state any swine which have been pseudorabies vaccinated. M.G.L. c. 129 §14E.

5. All swine shall originate from qualified pseudorabies-free herds or herds in qualified pseudorabies free states only.

Sheep Specific Information

See 9 CFR 79 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06

1. No sheep will be allowed entry from flocks in which Scrapie has been diagnosed or in which animals are under surveillance for Scrapie during the previous 18 months. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363-2290.
2. No sheep will be permitted entry from flocks in which soremouth has existed or in which soremouth vaccine had been administered in the previous sixty (60) days.
3. Sheep must be free from visual evidence of foot rot, soremouth, pinkeye, ringworm, and open or draining wounds.
4. While not required, it is strongly recommended that sheep be currently vaccinated against rabies.

Equine Specific Information

See M.G.L. c. 128 §§2C. 44. 330 CMR 16.05

1. All equines entering a Massachusetts (MA) fairground originating from both within or outside Massachusetts must be accompanied by a valid health certificate and have a record of negative EIA (Coggins) test within the last 12 months.
2. All equines must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: mange, ringworm, soring, strangles, and open or draining wounds.
3. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all equines be vaccinated for rabies, tetanus, EEE and NV within one year of the fair.

Dog and Cat Specific Information

See M.G.L c. 129 §39G

1. All dogs and cats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: kennel cough, distemper, hepatitis, parvo, ringworm, and mange.
2. All dogs and cats must be accompanied by a valid or current vaccination certificate for rabies.

2026 NE Exhibition Health Certificate Rules 1 of 3

All species

- **Animals of all species susceptible to HPAI** are potentially subject to quarantine as ordered by the State Veterinarian if HPAI is detected on a premises where the animal is or was exhibited.
 - **If HPAI is detected in cattle in any New England State**, the Agreement between the New England State Veterinarians to allow the use of a single, fair and show season OCVI for New England animals being exhibited in New England will be voided. All exhibited animals would need to be accompanied by an OCVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of being checked in at the show premises and/or other state import requirements.
 - Best biosecurity practices for all species should be implemented.
- Contact the state where animals will be exhibited for the latest updated information.

2026 Fair and Show New England Health Certificates

For the 2026 Show and Fair Season, domesticated animals from New England states (CT, ME, MA, NH, RI, and VT) may be exhibited at fairs and shows in New England throughout the fair and show season using a single Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) that meet the requirements outlined in this memo.

General Requirements (all NE states):

- A single OCVI from the animals' home state may be completed for travel to and from the New England states in which the animals will be exhibited.
 - Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one OCVI with appropriate individual IDs and descriptions.
 - Animals of different species may not be listed on the same official health certificate.
 - An itinerary of the **names** and **locations** for each New England fair or show at which owner expects to show the listed animals and the **dates when each animal is expected to be on each site**, must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time the OCVI is written.
 - A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the OCVI (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show.
 - That proposed list should be **signed by the veterinarian and the owner/ exhibitor** and reference the relevant OCVI number(s).
 - Electronic OCVIs **must include this list of exhibition names, addresses, and dated in the “remarks and comments” section**
- The **first show or fair** where the listed animals will be exhibited will be the **Consignee** on the OCVI, as shown here:

2026 NE Exhibition Health Certificate Rules 2 of 3

- Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were physically on show/fairgrounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check-in.
- **Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home.** Any animal that is **refused entry** to any exhibition during 2026 for health reasons must have a new OCVI issued by an accredited veterinarian **within 30 days** of the next fair or show where it will be exhibited.
- Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

RULES AND INFORMATION FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

Note: The Barnstable County Fair is a seven-day event. Please consult the Exhibitor Handbook for show dates, check-in times, and schedules.

Entries

Animals must be entered under the owner's name, not a farm name. Entries cannot be made under both an owner and a farm name.

Exhibitor Conduct

Any exhibitor found defacing or damaging another exhibitor's animal or property will be required to leave the Fair and will forfeit all premium money, as determined by the Livestock Committee.

Health Regulations

The 2026 Massachusetts Fair Animal Health Rules apply to all livestock. All animals must have tags or tattoos, and registration papers must be available at check-in and throughout the Fair. A health check-in with the Fair veterinarian is mandatory. Veterinary health certificates for all animals must be presented to the Show Superintendent upon arrival, before unloading. Animals must undergo a hands-on inspection by the Fair veterinarian. Animals not submitted for examination will not be allowed on the grounds.

Physical Condition of Animals

All animals must arrive in good condition—clean, properly fed, and free from visible signs of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease. The Show Superintendent, Committee, or Judge may reject any animal they consider unfit. Their decision is final.

Bedding and Supplies

Limited straw, shavings, or sawdust will be provided. Exhibitors must bring their own hay, feed, water tubs, and buckets. Extra hay may be stored in a designated area on the grounds.

Handling and Fitting

Exhibitors must work on their own animals. Parents, advisors, coaches, or friends may not assist with fitting or show preparation before or during show day. Violations will result in disqualification.

Dress Code

All exhibitors must wear clean, professional show attire: white shirts, farm shirts, or 4-H T-shirts, with white or tan pants and closed-toe shoes. Shorts, sandals, bathing suits, and bare feet are not permitted.

Barn and Display Area

Exhibitors must keep their area clean and organized. Farm signs, banners, and decorations are encouraged but must not obstruct other exhibitors or create safety hazards.

Parking and Access

Vehicles must park in designated areas only. Only vehicles carrying animals or supplies may access the Fairgrounds, and only with a Gate 4 pass. Without a Gate 4 pass, vehicles will not be admitted. No parking is allowed inside the Fairgrounds. Deliveries must be completed before 10:00 a.m. during Fair week.

Exhibitor Services

"Exhibitor Only" showers are available with a key from the Livestock Superintendent. Be respectful, limit shower time, and clean up afterward. Exhibitors who do not follow these rules will lose shower privileges.

Camping

Camper space requires advance registration and payment of \$10.00 dollars per night per camper. Submit the Camper Registration Form with your entry. Camping is located in Lot 1 across from Gate 4. Quiet hours are from 11:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. More than one noise warning will result in removal from the grounds. No camping reservation will be held without full payment.

Liability and Insurance

The Fair takes reasonable precautions for the safety of all animals and exhibits, but participation is at the exhibitor's own risk. The Barnstable County Fair assumes no responsibility for loss or damage to any animal, equipment, or personal property. Exhibitors agree to accept full responsibility for any loss, injury, or damage caused by their animals or equipment, and to indemnify and hold harmless the Barnstable County Fair and its management from any resulting claims. Exhibitors are encouraged to obtain liability insurance for their animals and equipment.

Fleece and Yarn

A. Fleece to Shawl Competition: Pending participation. Scheduled for Sunday, July 26, 2026, at 12:00 p.m. There will be adult and junior divisions.

B. Spinning Bee: Thursday, July 23, 2026, at 6:00 p.m. Contestants must start with an empty spool and check in by 5:30 p.m. There will be adult and junior divisions, including a drop spindle competition and a short fun event.

- **Eligibility:** All fleeces must come from sheep owned by the exhibitor and shorn during the current spring.
- **Entries:** An entry card must be completed for each entry.
- **Classes:** The committee reserves the right to combine, remove, or create classes as needed. The judge's decision is final.
- **Fleeces:** Fleeces should be rolled with the skin side out and placed in clear plastic bags. Each bag must be securely tagged with the exhibitor's name, address, telephone number, and the breed of sheep.
- **Judging:** Fleeces will be evaluated on cleanliness, uniformity of grade, color, crimp, staple length, fiber strength, and handle (feel). White fleeces must be free of colored fibers. Second cuts made by the shearer, which result in shorter fibers, are considered less desirable. The judge will assign each fleece to the appropriate class. All yarns must be handspun from 100 percent wool unless otherwise noted, and only one yarn entry is allowed per class.
- **Age:** Junior exhibitors are those 18 years of age or younger.

2. The ADGA Combined Show and Junior Doe Show ARE separately sanctioned. Junior does will be shown in the combined show ONLY as needed to make each breed official. No premiums will be paid for the junior division of the combined show.
3. **ADGA rules shall govern.**
4. The judge's decision is final. ADGA Grand Champion or Best of Breed winners must compete for Best in Show or forfeit the leg.
5. **Order of breeds shown is scheduled to be: Nigerian Dwarf, Recorded Grade, Alpine, Nubian, All Other Purebred.** Order of breeds is subject to change.
6. Show premiums will be paid corresponding to the Judge's award in the show ring. The judge's decision will be final.
7. All animals must be in place at the Fair by 10:00 a.m. in order to qualify for premium money and must remain until 6:30 p.m. or the completion of the show, whichever is later. Leaving before 6:30 p.m. will result in loss of premium money.

8. Ages for both goats and youth classes are the age as of that date of the show.

- **Entries:** Entry fee for poultry is \$1.00. Entries must be received by July 10, 2026.
- **Entries:** When entering animals into any Livestock Show at the Barnstable County Fair, the OWNER'S name MUST be used and not the farm name. **Under NO circumstances will entries be allowed in both the owner's name and a farm name.**
- **Arrivals and Departures:** Exhibitors must arrive with birds between 12:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. on Sunday July 19, 2026 and must depart between 6:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 26, 2026.
- **Health:** No poultry will be admitted to a fairground until it has been individually inspected.
 - All poultry must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: infectious bronchitis, coryza, pullorum-salmonella, fowl-pox, external parasites and laryngotracheitis.
 - Each bird must be accompanied by written proof (ID card or test report) and banding that the breeding flock was blood-tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within one year prior to entry date
 - Any animal being treated for any ailment or parasite will not be allowed to be shown.
 - During the show, all animals will be examined daily for symptoms of disease, and any sick bird must be removed from the fairground by the owner.
- **Birds:** No birds vaccinated within 60 days may be shown. No birds under 4 months of age may be shown.

Scholarship Award

Since 1974 the Barnstable County Agricultural Society, Inc. has been awarding scholarships to Barnstable County High School Seniors. In the infancy of the program \$3,000 was offered and very few applied. Today there are over 40 applicants yearly and up to \$50,000 is awarded.

To qualify for the scholarships applicants must reside in Barnstable County and plan to further their education in ANY field. Recipients can receive the award for up to 4 years, by maintaining their majors in the required fields and recipients must maintain a GPA of 2.5 or higher. Applications are sent to high school guidance counselors each year.
